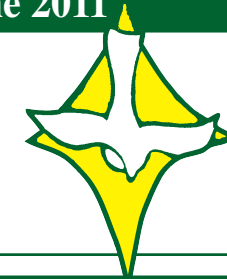

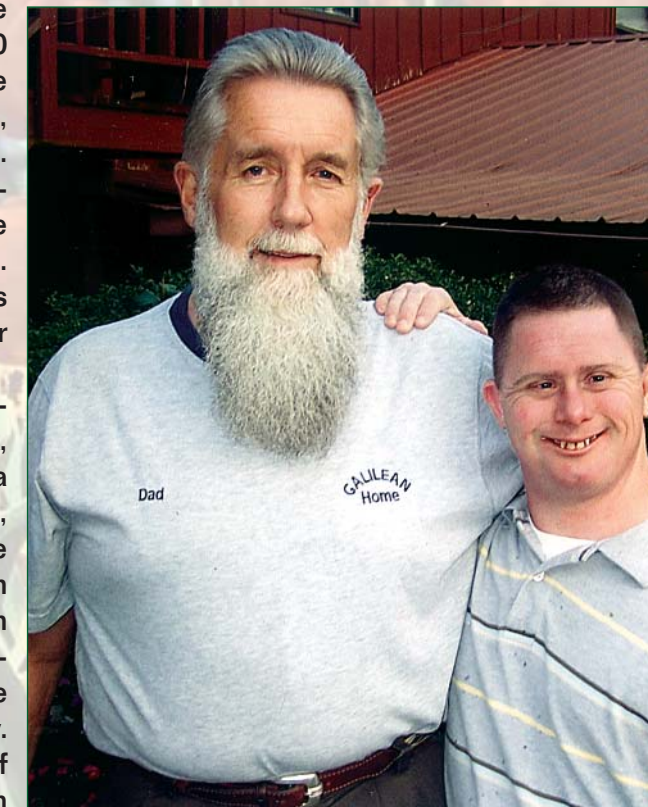
Our group who traveled to Ohio last week, singing and presenting a Galilean Home program, returned with a favorable report. There were 25 on this trip. The first church service was around Dayton, Ohio. The next three were in Holmes County. A lot, and I mean a lot, of former VS girls were in attendance and had all of

the leg work and particulars done ahead of our group, which included lodging and meals. Plans are in the works for the next trip to Pennsylvania, the Lancaster area, possibly June 9-14th. We'll know all the details as they develop. We are tentatively planning on being in Indiana July 13-19th. We will start in Madison and work our way up to the Goshen and Shipshewana area. We way even make it to the Southern Michigan area. If you are

I was left to hold down the fort and to keep the Indians who were left behind in some fashion of order. It was a very unusual, interesting experience for me as I was always the "minister of transportation" and Mom was in charge of the singing and most of the "P.R.". But, I am not retired to the Daudy House yet. I still speak in churches whenever there are requests happening my way. I had two speaking engagements in April, but none so far in May. While I was "vacationing" here at home for five days, I spent a lot of time with James and Joshua, who did not travel on this trip. Josh has been with us about two years. He is 21, with cerebral palsy and unable to speak. All of us have learned how to interpret his various sounds well enough to know what he wants. James is 42 and has been a fixture here at the Home since he was 12 or 13, about 30 years. Sandy and I adopted him right after he entered our home. He has Downs

Syndrome and is a very interesting and amusing boy, to say the least. He is always into something or planning some kind of escapade. He lives in my apartment and thinks he is king of the castle and, actually, he probably is.

In just two weeks it will be four years that Mom left us. Time really does march on. She might be gone in a physical sense, but in my heart, she will always remain. No one can bump her out of that spot. We had 45 glorious years together and I am looking forward to the grand reunion where time is no more. Eternity has no end.

It was fall of 1969 when we adopted Jeremy, which started us on this journey for nearly 42 years. A lot of water has flowed under the bridge all these years. It always amazes me how God took two young people and put us on the mission we are still doing. I was a reckless, young 22 year old with no real aim or goals in life. Until I met a quiet (yes, she used to be), 18 year old Polish Catholic girl who felt she could tame this bronco. It didn't take her long to accomplish this. But, I believe it was all a divine relationship as He prepared us for the work ahead. This was 1963 in Detroit, Michigan. All that the Galilean Home has been able to accomplish and all the young children we have been able to help over these 40+ years has only been possible because God formed a team to fulfill this calling. We were the legs and arms doing the physical aspect of our mission as God guided us and our many, many supporters He directed as the source to complete the work. Sandy and I have both traveled to many third world countries, bringing children into the States for medical attention they could not obtain in their home countries. We, at one time, estimated that over 800 children have graced our doorway. That is a conservative number. I don't really like to talk numbers, because that is not important. Only if we were able to change one child's life and lead them to the Lord would it then be worth all the work of 40 years.

As all of us know and experience, times are TOUGH! Prices are up on everything, not just gasoline. So many people are out of work, being laid off from their jobs. The last two years have been the hardest for us, as it has been for many ministries and businesses.

But, you have heard or seen me say that Sandy left me with final instructions on her death bed. "Dad, don't quit, don't ever give up". These words echo in my head and heart daily. I plan to honor her request (or was it an order?) as long as God supplies me with the health and strength needed to carry on. As long as God's people continue standing behind and with us, providing the prayers and funding needed to endure, we will remain steadfast. I will be 71 in October, Lord willing, but I feel great despite small aches and pains on occasion. Of course, having many of my married children close by and my army of grandkids under foot, how can I not continue on? If I slowed down, I would be tripping over so many of them.

Well, I will close for now and let the enclosed pictures speak for themselves. One picture is worth a thousand words so here are about 10,000 words to enjoy.

One last reminder, our 22nd Annual Quilt Auction is on October 14th, always the second Friday in October. The time really sneaks up on us. No matter how much work it is, it is always a joy to see old friends who come to be a part of this important event. It our largest fundraiser of the year. Absolutely beautiful quilts are made and sent to us from all over the United States and sometimes Canada. There is food, fun, and fellowship to be had by all. Won't you come and witness this for yourself?
